

In 2019, tour-guide, Doug Mitchell, provided Jim with the declassified daily after action reports of the 87th Infantry Division and the 912th Field Artillery, These reports have been woven together with over 240 letters between his parents, 60+ photos with narrative captions (both from family albums and taken by Doug Mitchell, the meticulous records his father kept during his time in Europe and accounts of other 87th Division veterans.. Readers of this book will know exactly where the 87th and 912th were throughout the duration of combat which began in early December 1944 until the European armistice on May 8, 1945 and receive an exceptionally vivid detail about the actual price paid by our WW II Veterans in exchange for the many freedoms that we enjoy today.

VE Day

May 8th, 1945 became a date for history—V-E day—Victory in Europe. While the nations of the world were celebrating the historic announcement with ringing church bells, parades and parties, a different type of celebration was going on in Plauen and Falkenstein. Captured enemy equipment was being rounded up and collected in huge parking lots, and the battle weary soldiers were busy "welcoming" the hundreds of German soldiers streaming in from the east to surrender.

In Falkenstein convoy after convoy of German vehicles rolled in loaded with the unconditionally surrendered "supermen." Rapidly reloading into American vehicles they were speeded on the way to the rear.

At the big airfield outside Plauen, the 345th's guards were startled when the Luftwaffe began landing there once again; but this time their planes came in and were parked for the last time; the pilots consigned to the prisoner of war cages.

Grace Marie Sherk (wife of Ervin Sherk)	I-346



It is with a deep sense of loss that we announce the passing of **Grace M. Sherk (wife of Ervin J. Sherk—I-346)** on Wednesday, April 16, 2025. She passed peacefully in her home at Grossmont Gardens in La Mesa, CA at the age of 104 years and five months.

Born on a farm in Prescott, Pennsylvania on November 16, 1920, she was the daughter of the late Walter Simon and Bessie Mae (Hower) Deck and the younger sister of the late Beulah Elizabeth Troutman Lutz.

After school and during summers, in addition to helping on the farm, she assisted several families with housework and childcare. Since her parents were tenant farmers, they moved several times during her childhood. In 1933 her parents purchased a farm in Kutztown. This enabled Grace to finish her education at Myerstown High School, graduat-

ing in the Class of 1938.

In 1937 she met the love of her life, Ervin J. Sherk, and after dating for 6-1/2 years they married on Christmas Day 1943. In 1944, while Ervin was in basic training at Camp Wolters, Mineral Wells, TX, Grace worked for the post master of Mineral Wells. Ervin was sent to Europe and fought in the Battle of the Bulge; Grace returned to Pennsylvania and worked in a shoe factory.

When their only child, Janice Grace, was born in 1947, Grace became a stay-at-home mother. She re-

turned to work in 1959 at a local knitting mill. After several years Grace began working for Sterling Drug Corporation in the Bayer aspirin plant in Myerstown and retired from there in 1983.

She and Ervin loved to travel and attended many Army reunions of the 87th Infantry Division which included several cruises and a trip to Europe in 1976 where they revisited the route the 87th had taken during the war. They also enjoyed volunteering in R.S.V.P. of Lebanon County and the American Red Cross.

They loved to spend time at their mountain home in northern PA. Ervin was an avid hunter and spent hunting season in their home-away-from-home with Grace going along to do the cooking. They traveled to Proctor near Williamsport, PA all through the year so they could enjoy the beauty of the seasons. It wasn't unusual to see both of them on riding mowers as they cut the nearly one-acre lawn.

On June 27, 2006 Ervin suddenly passed away and Grace remained in her home and enjoyed tending her small garden. In 2010 Grace decided to move to San Diego to be closer to her daughter, Janice G. Klick, her son-in-law Larry E. Klick and grandson David M. Klick.

Grace lived at Grossmont Gardens for 14 years and made many friends during that time. She had a strong faith, a wonderful sense of humor and was always willing to assist people when they needed help. Everyone said she had a positive attitude, a warm smile, sparkling blue eyes, and never looked her age. She helped in the community's library for six years. Grace enjoyed cooking, baking, gardening, reading, crocheting, word search puzzles and a game called Crazy Dice.

In addition to Larry, Janice and David, she is survived by a niece, Helen Ernst, of Wyomissing, PA.

As per her request, a memorial service was held in her home church of St. Luke Lutheran Church, Schaefferstown, Pennsylvania on June 28, 2025 with the Rev. Angela Hammer officiating. Following the 11:00 a.m. service, she will be laid to rest next to her husband of 63 years in the Schaefferstown Cemetery. In lieu of flowers, memorial gifts may be made to St. Luke Lutheran Church, P. O. Box 278, Schaefferstown, PA 17088.

The family wishes to thank the staff at Grossmont Gardens for the love, care and friendships they shared with Grace over the years and to Radiant Hospice, San Diego, CA who showed such loving care and compassion during Grace's last days.

Information was obtained from the records of Paul Nessman (F&M-347), www.findagrave.com, www.newspapers.com, www.ancestry.com, and 87th General Orders and History.

<u>February 2, 1945 — 10 Killed</u> <u>February 3, 1945 — 9 Killed</u>

345th Regimental History: February 2, 1945. The entire regiment was on the move by Division order. The First Battalion moved to Andler, the Second to Verschneid, the Third to Lauderfeld, Service Company to Heuem and Regimental Headquarters to a modern apartment building on the outskirts of Auw, Germany.

346th After-Action Report: February 2, 1945. Regiment in Division Reserve. Received order to move forward. Rear elements closed into Schonberg. Third Battalion moved to town of Lauderfelt. Tiger patrol moved beyond Krewinkle to investigate Siegfried Line bunkers on Hill 628. Regimental Command Post moved forward from St. Vith to Schonberg.

346th After-Action Report: February 3, 1945. Completed move to forward positions. Second Battalion moved to vicinity of Auw. First Battalion captured town of Krewinkel. Third Battalion moved to vicinity of Weckerath. Battalions improving and consolidating positions. Patrolling to front continued. Weather – cloudy, cool and light rain. Casualties – rather heavy. Regimental Command Post moved to Auw, Germany.

347th Regimental History: February 2 and 3, 1945. The Third Battalion was in Manderfeld and was to hold. The Second Battalion was to continue the attack on Weckerath, just a few hundred yards northwest of Auw, and from there, continue the attack due east to Krewinkel. The First Battalion was to move up from Laudesfeld to Wischeid and Verschneid. The whole zone was filled with a series of small towns and each of them had to be carefully cleared in order to allow the Division advance. By noon, the First Battalion was ordered to proceed to the Division objective of Losheim, the Second Battalion was to move on to Manderfeld and the Third Battalion was to go from Manderfeld to Berterath. The Regimental Forward Command Post was moved to Manderfeld and the final stage in the movement to the Siegfried Line was set.

The Second Battalion started its movement from Weckerath to Manderfeld early in the morning on the 3rd. At the same time, the Third Battalion moved on from Manderfeld to Berterath and the First Battalion was in the process of it advance to Losheim.





Parents of Keith Ottsen Learn How He Died in Action

Mr. and Mrs. G. J. Ottsen, 1122 Maplewood drive NE, have received word from the commanding officer of the infantry division of which their son, Pfc. Keith, was a member. With Patton's Third army, he was killed in action in Belgium Feb. 2. "Near Hume, Belgium, we were

under heavy artillery and mortar fire all night," the communication said. "Your son had volunteered to deliver a message to an adja-cent unit. He had left his fox hole and moved approximately 300 yards, when he was caught in heavy enemy mortar barrage. . . . A shell landed a few feet from


him, and the concussion killed him instantly.

"He was buried in the military cemetery at Hamm, Luxembourg. Keith's death was as he had wished it. He had remarked to his father before going overseas, "If my number is called, I hope I get it quickly and completely, as I don't want to be a burden on someone the rest of my life."


Research

We have received a number of requests via our Website and Facebook page for information about our 87th veterans from their relatives, most not having any information beyond the knowledge of their service in the 87th. See some examples on page 5. Barbara Strang (daughter of Ted Anderson, B-912FA), Tim Muilenburg (son of Ivan Muilenburg, C-549AAA) and I handle most of the inquiries.

For starters, our website has a significant amount of information, and I will provide an overview of what we have based on these requests. Unfortunately, our information is far from complete. You may remember the research Ken Virgil (son of George Virgil L-347) performed to document his father's participation in the Rhine Crossing on March 25, 1945 that we chronicled in the December 2023 issue of the Golden Acorn News. His drive to get the 87th Division units involved in the crossing awarded the Arrowhead coupled with all these requests prompted me to get trained as a National Archives Researcher and visit the National Personnel Records Center in St. Louis at the end of May.

The first place I look for information about an 87th veteran is on the 87th WWII Roster, which was put together by Jim Amor (A-345) and has just recently been updated. Go to Facts & Stats in the left margin and then WWII Rosters in the upper menu bar. The page continues inks to aforementioned roster and wel as rosters for D-345 and 787 Ordnance. A Find (or CTRL F) with Amor shows Jim Amor and his unit.



The Archives has sections on Publications, Documents, Maps and After Action Reports, and we will soon be adding more after action reports and a section on Morning Reports. The Publications section contains all copies of the Golden Acorn News from 1942 until 2008, when the 87th Infantry Division Association became the 87th Infantry Division Legacy Association. 87th IDLA GANs are in the Members section. Under Documents, letters of commendation from the commanders, including General George S. Patton, unit citations and other important announcement as well the service album of Lt. Colonel, Robert Hibbert, Jr.. The excellent 87th Division Map tracking their movements across Europe is in the map section along with a couple of battle maps.

The Facts and Stats section contains lists and tables, such as the WWII Roster, 87th make-up by unit, commanding officers, and command posts. Most importantly, there is a link to a spreadsheet of those Killed in Action with several worksheets with associated statistics. Below is an excerpt from that file.

Emmerich Oths, great grandson of Eldon Abraham Schultz, sent a note via Contact Us on the website requesting information on his great grandfather. He is pictured in this photo of Company I of the 347th Infantry Regiment on pages 140 and 141 of the Regimental History. How did I find this information. First I went to the WWII Roster in the Archives section. Search the pdf filr using CTRL F and enter Schultz to find Eldon and determine his unit. Next go to the Documents Section and open the Regimental History of the 347th and do another search of the pdf file. Eldon's name shows up a couple of time, but more interesting is his name is in the key to the Company I photo taken back in the States (most likely). In the actual book, the photo is in the fold across two pages. In the pdf, the two halves are on separate pages, but with a little work, we can find Eldon. I took the liberty of splicing them together above and then zooming in on the young private. I hope I counted correctly.

On the website, in the Articles section, there are many fist hand and other accounts, most by our veterans and members. We also have an extensive video library to accompany the articles.



The National Personnel Records Center is a department of the National Archives. On April 12, 1973, the previous location of the NPRC in St. Louis burned down resulting in the loss of 16-18 million records. The efforts to recover records damaged in the fire continues to this day at the new NPRC just north of St. Louis.

To arrange a trip to the NPRC, I sent an Email to starr.archives@nara.gov. I received the rplay below and completed the registration. I took the Researcher Orientation and quiz, which took about an hour, and completed the record request forms. Finally I made my appointment. The appointments are for the entire day and are electronic and provide e-tickets. There are a number of prohibited items, like coats and ink pens, that can lead to damage of some of the original documents. I had some difficulty downloading the e-tickets, so along with the prohibitions, I had some anxiety when I arrived. This was unnecessary as the staff was very helpful and accommodating. When you arrive, part in the parking lot to the right before the guard gate and go to the main lobby for a security screening. The records room reception is just to right. There's a snack bar in the lobby to get refreshments. Not even water is allowed in the records room.

The National Archives requires that all researchers complete the following to be issued a Researcher ID Card at their visit. Please finish these items prior to your visit.

- Complete the **National Archives Researcher Application** by visiting: https://researchercommunity.force.com/securitycentral/s/kiosk-registration
- You will also need to complete the NARA Virtual Researcher Orientation which can be found here: https://rise.articulate.com/share/uK5NGkSpg74JHLTOcGPmM4e94MJyxQgD#/. Once you have finished, the system will generate a certificate of completion which you'll need to forward to this email thread.
- Attached you will find the NA-13173 Request Form for military and civilian personnel records. When filling out the request form, please provide as much information as possible. This will assist us with locating the records you're requesting. You will need to fill out one form, per individual whose records you're requesting. You can attach each request to your email, or include them all in a PDF portfolio, whichever is easiest for you. If you digitally sign your Request Form, please do not lock the file. If you do not yet have a NARA Researcher ID, please leave the "Researcher ID Card Number" field blank. Your card and number will be issued to you at your appointment. You will receive confirmation from this email address once we've received your requests.
- We have transitioned to Eventbrite for scheduling research appointments. We're currently scheduling up to 90 days out for textual. If you choose a date, and it is sold out, that means there are no more appointments for that day. Each Week, at 12 AM on Mondays, a new week of appointments are added to Eventbrite. You can sign up for notifications on that platform. Please visit https://www.eventbrite.com/o/national-archives-at-st-louis-49167066023 to schedule your appointment and select a date from the event "Textual Research Appointment" (for paper documents). We will confirm your appointment after we have received your certificate, application, and request forms.

Once I had checked in at the registration desk and received my researcher credentials, I was met by Archives Specialist, Holly Rivet. I sat down with Holly, so she got an idea of my experience and research objectives, which are learning more about our 87th veterans for their relatives. She then gave me the crash course on viewing records. They have good work stations at which they have stands to place documents for photographing and video with your phone or other device. Other more experienced researchers were there with their own scanning equipment. Phones, cameras and scanners are allowed. For all


this it is critical to handle all these documents carefully, not letting them hang off an edge or placing something else on top of them. One reasearcher was meticulously removing toilet paper thin documents form a binder for scanning and them replacing them. Slow and tedious work. For starters I received the file of David Buteau for viewing. I describe what I found on the next page.


After looking at the records I requested, Holly took me to the morning reports files. Here I was reintroduced to microfilm. On the computers provided, we looked up the location of the morning reports for the 87th Division from December 1944. The microfilm is stored in



large, metal, fire-proof file drawers and can be viewed on the traditional screen or computer monitors. In any case, the film is on reels as shown above and need to threaded on either set-up. While there is a motor to advance and rewind, it is preferable to hand turn while moving from page to page, once you find your place. The images contain 3 cards as show below. The always indicate the location of the unit on the given day and often give the map coordinates using the Modified British System. They will indicate if holding position, engaged or moving. Most importantly they will give information on the soldiers giving a summary of those present on the 1st month and then movements, such as leaves, transfers, MIA and KIA. While an unfortunate, piece of information, I did find the date of the 87th IDLA President's father's (Woodrow Lennon B-347) capture on December 16, 1944. In his request on page 4 of this edition of the GAN, I provided John Noble with the morning reports for Company C, so he could get day by day locations of his father's unit for a visit to the Saar he was planning (I hope to report on that). I was able to scan the images on the monitors and then upload them to the cloud (Google Drive for me).

Unfortunately, I only had 5 hours, but I found a lot of interesting things. I am already planning my next trip and hopefully one to the National Archives in College Park, Maryland, where post-WWI regimental and unit records are primarily held.






Much of this information is on line at the <u>National Archives Catalog</u>.

Jennie Emerick, requested information on her grandfather, David H. Buteau, Jr. (D-345). She already knew his unit and some other basic information. Our Membership and Communications Chairman, Tim Muilenburg (son of Ivan Muilenburg, C-549AAA), searched the 345th Regimental History on the 87th IDLA website for her grandfathers name and found him in the Company D group photo on page 141. His name is also on page 186 for receiving the Combat Infantryman Badge, a very coveted medal.

My first request for records at the National Personnel Records Center (upper right) was for Jennie's grandfather. When I arrived, I was informed that David's records had been lost in the 1973 fire and they only had his final payslip, which had been filed elsewhere. The payslip still offered new information as to his service





after his return from leave, PFC Buteau was promoted to Corporal on the 20th.


While these are just small pieces of information, all of them ultimately can paint a picture of our veterans' service.

beyond his pay. It showed the day he returned to the US (7/11/45), his final day of service (11/30/45) and most importantly it offered his serial number. With the serial number I was able to search the microfilm using his name and serial number (Buteau AND 35091406), I quickly found two morning reports from Fort Jackson with his name. On February 1, 1944, David took a two-week leave and soon

Eligibility Requirements

Age/Grade Level: Applicant must be going into, or in their senior year of high school, or in their first or second year of college or a trade school

Minimum GPA: 2.5 or better on a 4.0 scale

Financial Need: Not Required

Other Academic Requirements: Currently attending as a full-time student (as determined by your school's financial aid office)

Post High School Graduation Plan: Attend an accredited, two or four-year, not-for-profit institution or trade school within the US

Extracurricular: Be active in extra-curricular activities and community service. Special attention will be noted for volunteer work connected with the activities of the military or first responders including but not limited to programs regarding those who have given service to society.

Military: Identify a relative, friend or other admired person involved with the 87th Infantry Division or the Battle of the Bulge in some way.

Miscellaneous: Demonstrate a willingness to promote the legacy of the 87th Infantry Division's contribution to World War II.

Application Details

Transcript: A seven semester transcript must be provided – an unofficial copy is acceptable.

Resume/Activity List: Required – any format is acceptable – there is space on the application form.

Recommendation Letters: Two letters of Recommendation: from: principal or counselor of school, clergyman, professor, or other un-related person knowing of applicant's character.

Other Materials: A completed application form and an essay (a minimum of 500 words) on the contribution of the 87th Infantry Division in World War II in your own words.

Deadline: July 30, 2025 for an award during the upcoming school year.

Award: The award will be announced during the upcoming annual reunion of the 87th Infantry Division Legacy Association (normally taking place during the fall) and will be posted on the website.
